Miniature Orchids for the Cattleya Grower Speaker: Alan Koch

Alan Koch owns and operates Gold Country Orchids where he specializes in miniature and compact Cattleyas. His talk will cover 50 miniature orchids that do well for growers who let their plants dry between waterings and who don't necessarily fertilize their plants often.

Alan started growing orchids in 1969 with Cymbidiums given to him by an aunt. While in college, he became interested in other orchids and discovered many would grow outdoors in Southern California.

He has moved five times as his orchid obsession has led to the need for more growing space. With the last move, he purchased 10 acres of land in Lincoln, California for his 300,000 orchids. He is recognized as an expert in the Brazilian Cattleya alliance and a trend setter in miniature Cattleya breeding. Alan has been published in the Orchid Digest, and the American Orchid Society magazines. He has also been published in the proceedings of the World Orchid Conference. He is an internationally known speaker.

He is a past member of the AOS Judging Committee, and the Research Committee, as well as an Accredited Judge and is Vice-chair and Training Coordinator for the California Sierra Nevada Judging Center. Alan also served two terms on the Orchid Digest Executive Committee and Board of Directors, and is one of the current directors, as well as a Trustee for the AOS.

Alan will give the skill session on Orchids 101 and will also provide the Opportunity Table plants.

President's Corner

One of the great things about opportunity tables is that you never really know what orchid you'll end up selecting from those that remain. Of course, we all have looked at the table in advance, and we have mentally selected those we would like most, but in the end you could end up with almost anything.

Choosing a plant from a genus new to you from the opportunity table is an excellent way to learn about something new. When this happens to me, my first reaction is to do a little research and find out more about the plant and what the various orchid growing guides claim is the correct culture. I temper this information with a little research into the climate and conditions where that particular plant thrives in nature – sometimes the conditions from nature don't agree with what's written in the guides, and in those cases I lean toward what nature indicates. Often the conditions are similar to those for other plants already in our collection, but sometimes not.

Interestingly, by attempting to grow something new, and grow it well, the other plants in our collection also seem to benefit. Whether this is due to increased attention, a slight modification in growing conditions, or some other factor, I don't know, but it has happened again and again. I personally think it's the increased attention, because something new will draw one into the growing area much more often – there's nothing quite so exciting as seeing a new plant grow and bloom for the first time. This is exactly why some of the best growers in our society have very eclectic collections with a few plants each from many different genera. They've learned over time that diversity in a collection can be a major growing benefit, and can keep orchid interest at a high level.

Alan Koch of Gold Country Orchids is our speaker this month, and he'll be talking about smaller orchids that can be grown with mini-cattleyas and other smaller intermediate condition orchids. I'm sure he'll have an interesting and varied opportunity table, and there will probably be plants with which many of us are not familiar. I encourage each of you to take a chance and choose something different from the table this time. You'll be surprised at how much renewed interest something totally new and different can generate.

I ♥ Phrags

While Phragmipediums bloom throughout the year, this is the time of year when the greatest number are in bud and bloom together at my house.

As I look across my family room at the phrags on the plant stand I realize that the show-stopper, the orchid my eyes go to first, is the besseae. The hybrids may be larger in flower and in plant size, but none really match the brilliant color of the besseae.

There are many other phragmipedium species, each with its own charms, but besseae seems like the crown jewel to me. Of course, if I could make a hybrid with the petal length of warscewiczianum (around 2 - 3 ft.) and the colors of besseae I would be pretty darn happy.

One thing I love about phrags is that it is hard to overwater most of them. I like to water! They are picky about their water though - to avoid crispy brown leaf ends, they need reverse osmosis, distilled, or rain water. I give mine reverse osmosis water.

Another thing I appreciate is that they often bloom sequentially for months, with the flowers dropping off while still appearing perfect, so they never look ratty.

The long petaled phrags are exciting to watch open. The bud becomes several inches long. With backlighting you can see the pouch inside and the long petals along each edge. Then the sides split open, while the tip holds together, and the long petals start to loop out of the sides, until finally the tip breaks apart and the flower opens.

I give mine more light than many resources recommend. They get moved around to the sunny area on the greenhouse benches throughout the year. They seem to like it. (Except seedlings - those seem to prefer the bottom shelf.) Of course, they bloom fine in the house, which is where they head once the first bud opens, but the time in the greenhouse seems to make the stems and leaves much stronger.

Most written cultural articles recommend repotting them every six months. I often let them go two years. This is not a recommendation!

Some of my collection has come from local growers and society members - Dennis Olivas, White Oak Orchids, Mary Gerritsen, Napa Valley Orchids, Mike Drilling, and Orchids of Los Osos (besseae in
